

### **GREAT INDIAN TRAVEL BAZAAR**

On May 5, 2024, the 13th edition of the Great Indian Travel Bazaar (GITB) was held in Jaipur, Rajasthan. The event was organised by the Department of Tourism, Government of Rajasthan, and the Ministry of Tourism, Government of India, in partnership with the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI). This year's GITB was dedicated to promoting wedding tourism destinations, with a particular focus on Rajasthan. The "Wed In India" Expo 2024, a key highlight of the event, commenced at the Hotel Rambagh Palace.

Surrounded by dense forest, the rushing waters of the falls offer pristine water renowned for its medicinal benefits, flows downstream to the Karaiyar Dam. Just 15 minutes away, you can enjoy a rejuvenating herbal bath at Agasthiyar Falls, enhanced by the cascading waters.

Similarly, the Hogenakkal Falls in Dharmapuri district made a stunning debut in the bilingual film '*Raavanan*,' dazzling viewers with its spectacular views, notably in the introduction scene of the male protagonist shot near the Five Falls. However, this was not the first time Hogenakkal Falls appeared on screen. Back in 1969, the film '*Adimai Penn*' featured numerous scenes shot at this location, showcasing the entirety of the falls. Here's another gripping site the twisted, uprooted mangrove forest of Pichavaram has become a go-to filming location for a diverse range of movie genres, including adventure, mystery, and action. Notable examples include the introduction song of 'Dasavatharam' and scenes in 'Thupparivaalan,' where its sprawling expanse serves as the backdrop for key aerial shots and even the climactic scenes.

Many film songs from the 90s to the 2000s wouldn't miss the charm of Thirumalai Nayakar Mahal in Madurai. Its massive circular pillars and beautiful garden make it an outstanding example of Vijayanagara architecture, with a touch of European influence. Songs like "*Kannalane*" from "Bombay," "*Tera Bina"* from "*Guru*," and "*Ragasiya Kanavugal*" from the "*Bheemaa*" have all captured the Mahal's stunning presence on screen.

While the waters often take the spotlight in films, the misty locations of Tamil Nadu also shine, particularly the enchanting Nilgiris district. This region has been the backdrop for many film shoots. Notably, the UNESCO-listed Nilgiri Mountain Railways was featured in the song "*Chaiyya Chaiyya*" from "*Dil Se.*.". The Botanical Gardens in Ooty have also served as a popular shooting location.


### Lights, Camera and Tamil Nadu!!

### GUIDED HERITAGE WALK TO THIRUPPARANKUNDRAM



Thirupparankundram, situated on the outskirts of Madurai, stands as a testament to its rich religious heritage. On May 12, 2024, a heritage walk was organised by Tamil Nadu Tourism in collaboration with DHAN Foundation, INTACH, Travel Clud Madurai andPasumalai AvvaiPenkal Vattara Kalangiam of Madurai Urban Region, to Thirupparankundram.

Led by renowned archaeologist Dr.V.Vedachalam and Art Historian Dr.G.Sethuraman, the participants were lectured throughout the journey about the rock-cut cave temple, Jain beds with Tamil-Brahmi inscriptions and basreliefs. Thirupparankundram, as mentioned in Sangam literature, is primarily renowned for its Murugan temple, the narratives of Jain rock beds and three Tamil inscriptions dating back to the 1st century BCE provide compelling evidence of the hillocks' Jain connection. Visitors had a complete insight into the historical connections of Thirupparankundram.





In summer, the regions of Nilgiris and Kodaikanal unveil their new blooms to visitors, showcasing the season's fresh harvests of fruits and flowering delights. The Department of Tourism, in collaboration with the Department of Horticulture, organises summer festivals across various locations. These festivals feature many cultural programs, shows, and events, drawing domestic and international tourists alike.

The Kodaikanal Summer Festival popularly called the Kodai Vizha, commenced its 61st Flower Show on May 17, 2024, and lasted for 10 days in Bryant Park. The inauguration was led by District Collector Tmt. M.N. Poongodi, IAS, along with Superintendent of Police Dr. A. Pradeep, IPS and other officials. The event highlighted the vast floral diversity by showcasing 42 different flower kinds that were collected from different places.



Various cultural events, featuring folk arts and traditional music performances, served as a platform for local talents to showcase their skills, alongside competitions and a dog show. Additionally, sports events like the boat race at the Kodaikanal boat house were meticulously arranged to captivate and engage visitors.

The annual Ooty Flower Festival took place from May 10 to May 20, 2024, at the Ooty Botanical Garden. Celebrating its 126th year, the festival showcased an impressive variety of flowers, fruits, and vegetables. These dogs, ranging from highly trained to charmingly domestic, demonstrated their talents, captivating the audience with their performances.
