


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#### DEVOTEES FLOCK TO WITNESS MEENAKSHI THIRUKALYANAM



## MADURAI CHITHIRAI FESTIVAL

The annual 15-day Chithirai festival commenced on April 21, 2024, at Madurai. A sea of devoted pilgrims gathered at the Meenakshi Sundareshwara Temple to partake in the sacred union of Lord Sundershwar and the Goddess Meenakshi. Tamil Nadu Tourism in collaboration with the district administration, organised the festival. The celebration commenced with the ceremonial hoisting of a flag, known as *Kodi Yetram*. Culminating at the Kallazhagar Temple nestled in the Alagar Hills of Madurai, the final days of the festival honour Lord Kallazhagar, revered as the brother of Goddess Meenakshi and an incarnation of Lord Vishnu. Legend narrates Lord Kallazhagar's journey from Azhagarkoil to attend the marriage of his sister, Goddess Meenakshi, where he symbolically crosses the Vaigai River astride a golden horse.

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Following the hoisting of the flaq is the coronation of Goddess Meenakshi as the sovereign of Madurai. Subsequently, the Dikvijayam, where the newly crowned queen ventures onto the battlefield to reunite with her consort.

The Meenakshi Kalyanam is a celestial union representing the divine matrimony between Goddess Meenakshi and Lord Shiva (Sundareshvara) in Madurai. Notably, elaborate processions featuring the revered images of Meenakshi and Sundareshvara grace the streets, prominently carried on the Pushpa Pallakku and Yanai Vahanam. The Chariot festival, or Ter Tiruvila, occurs on the subsequent day, wherein the newlywed deities are paraded through the city in an ornate chariot to meet their subjects. The culmination of the festivities arrives with the Alagar affiliated festival, with the Vaishnava Kallalagar temple. This event features a poignant reenactment of Vishnu's rejection to enter Madurai, culminating with his return to Alagar Koil, depicted within a mandapam in Madhichiyam, situated amidst the Vaigai river's expanse.



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Tamil Nadu Tourism organized the Chithirai Cultural Festival at Thirumalai Nayak Palace from April 21, 2024, to April 25, 2024. As part of the event, international visitors were treated to the spectacle of the Meenakshi Sundareswarar Thirukalyanam. The five-day Cultural Festival featured a range of cultural programs, including Bharatanatyam and various Tamil folk dances. Both foreign tourists and locals alike reveled in the rich cultural experiences offered.

These saplings continue to grow, serving as living mementoes of your visit.

As you venture forward, prepare to sip on the trendy allure of the Pollachi coconut, just 40 km away from Coimbatore. Nestled amidst these coconut plantations are numerous accommodation options where you can spend the night surrounded by tall sky-reaching coconut trees. Experience the delightful sweetness of Pollachi coconut, a tropical treat packed with essential nutrients. With its flesh tender, smooth, and velvety texture each bite keeps you feeling your best. Whether you're enjoying it raw or adding it to your favourite recipes, Pollachi coconut is sure to be a highlight of your culinary adventure. #### **Architecture Heritage Walk**





Tamil Nadu Tourism, in collaboration with the Thanjavur Tourism Promotion Council organised an architectural heritage walk on April 7, 2024, emphasising the heritage architectural structures of Thanjavur.

The walk commenced from Big Temple Fort and concluded at the Old Collector's Office in Thanjavur, including notable sites such as the Moat, Four Main Streets, Thermutti, Palace Advisor's House, various Granary, lanes, Nallukal Mandapam, Kasukadai Street, Palace Fort Wall, Arms Tower, Bell Tower, Sangeeta Mahal, Palace Tank, Sarjah Mahal, Marsh Ranees Tower, Tanjore Medical School, GA Canal, and Irwin Bridge.

Architects Mr Shakthi Murugan and Mr Navalava led the walk, providing insights into the city's architectural history spanning from the Chola period to the British period. The participants were taken captivating journey through history Thanjavur's rich cultural and legacy.
